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Update From the Executive Director



Did you know that Land Trusts have protected over 56-million acres of land across the United States? Together these organizations are a powerful force for land conservation, recreation, and the future of natural resources. As part of that larger movement, the Falmouth Land Trust (FLT) has permanently protected 50 parcels of land in Falmouth totaling about 1,500 acres. As a small organization, we've done this without a lot of fanfare. Two years ago, we decided to ask our community how we were doing via an online survey. After carefully reviewing hundreds of responses, we learned that we were operating too humbly for our own good. Our constituents told us we needed to raise our profile and find new ways to engage with them. We heard you loud and clear! For the past two years, our small staff and dedicated board members have been working hard to be more visible in the community and articulate our mission across

town—offering free public programs, monthly guided hikes, and experiential learning for over 800 public school children.

Another way to raise our profile has been to re-establish a membership program. A robust member group backing our organization provides a critical voice for our mission and demonstrates that there is a constituency supporting our work. Membership isn't intended to be a big funding tool for us (although the dues support the costs of community programming); it is much more than that. FLT membership is about demonstrably connecting and aligning our community to our work. The Falmouth Land Trust is a community organization working to conserve land for the benefit of all. LAND CONSERVATION UPDATE: NEW PRESERVE CONSTRUCTED

We were delighted to tell you about our newest property, the Historic Morrill Farm, in our fall newsletter. As an update, FLT closed on the property in mid-December (the land was donated to the Land Trust by the Stillings who still own part of the property and wanted to protect the 28 acres of fields and forests in perpetuity.) This spring FLT's teams of staff and volunteers have been conducting inventories and bird surveys as we think about the best management system that will allow people to enjoy this magical

spot, but also supports and stewards wildlife and ecology of the site. The property is currently a "preserve under construction." FLT recently received an Ed Meadows Conservation Fund grant from the Maine Community Foundation for signage on the property. Ed Meadows led the Conservation Commission in Maine. He played a key role in millions of acres of land conservation by partnering with local land trusts. We are honored to be a recipient of a grant bearing his name and look forward to introducing the public to the property later in the year.
